RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

RATIONALE:

The development of human capital is an essential component in the realization of VISION 2036 pillar 1 and 2 which address Sustainable Economic Development and Human and Social Development (Human Resource Development Council, 2015). Secondly, the Botswana Education and Training Sector Strategic Plan (ETSSP 2015-2022) advocates for Botswana to become a knowledge-based economy. In line with the HRDC Interim Sector Skills in Demand (2016:12), there is need for skilled professionals in the creative industries sector, in particular arts managers, actors, film/stage and related directors, producers, designers, filmmakers, scriptwriters. The Ministry of Youth Empowerment, Sport and Culture Development and the Ministry of Investment, Trade and Industry have developed the National Strategy for the Creative Industries (2020-25). This strategy stresses the need to develop knowledgeable, well skilled, and competent creative artists who can produce world class products and services that will generate wealth for citizens and the country. It is in line with these national policies and strategies that the Bachelor of Fine Arts in Theatre Arts degree has been developed.



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PURPOSE:

The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with Knowledge, Skills and Competences to:

- Write scripts for stage, radio, film, and television.
- · Act and direct for stage, film, television.
- Design set, costume, and lighting for live and mediated productions.
- Manage arts and culture organizations.



Rules of Combination:

- Fundamental component: 96 credits.
- Core component: 300 credits.
- Optional/elective component: 84 credits.

Formative Assessment weighs 70% of the final grade.

Summative Assessment weighs 30% of the final grade.

Award of qualification: to be awarded the Bachelor of Fine Arts (Theatre) degree, a learner needs to have satisfied the applicable academic regulations and having accumulated a minimum total of 480 credits.

Certification: Learners meeting the prescribed requirements will be issued with a certificate for the Bachelor of Fine Art (Theatre) qualification.

Below are some observations made with respect to how this qualification compares with the four identified Universities:

Similarities:

- The duration of these qualifications are also four years.
- The main exit outcomes are very similar to this one in that they also focus on producing graduates well
 versed in both theory and practice and having skills to function effectively in a variety of creative
 industry work environments.
- Assessment consists of both formative and summative, with formative making up a larger part.
- Progression pathways as well as employment possibilities are very similar.

Differences:

- The Deakin, Wits and UCT are honours qualifications while the Bachelor of Fine Art (Theatre) is not.
- UCT qualification provides for Dance and Choreography as one of the areas of specialization which is not the case with the Bachelor of Fine Art (Theatre).
- The Sheffield University qualification being a combined programme, is not as intensive in theatre/performance as the Bachelor of Fine Art (Theatre) and, therefore, a graduate with their qualification would not have as much knowledge, skill, and competence in theatre as one with the Bachelor of Fine Art (Theatre).
- The levels at which these programmes are placed differs in accordance with their respective NQFs. For Deakin it is level 7; Wits and UCT level 8 while Sheffield is level 6.
- Required total credits at Wits is 480 but 630 at UCT.

REVIEW PERIOD

This qualification is subject to review every five years unless special circumstances dictate otherwise.
