RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

RATIONALE

As Botswana transforms from a resource based to a knowledge-based economy, the development of its human capital remains a priority evidenced by "more than 25 percent of the total government's annual budgets being allocated to the education sector over the past two decades" (NDP11:21). Human capital is key to sustainable development as espoused in the Vision 2036's pillars 1 and 2 which address Sustainable Economic Development and Human and Social Development (Vision 2036:12-21). With English recognized by the *Revised National Policy on Education (RNPE*, 1994) as both an official and international language, in an obviously multilingual global context, an English qualification has a major responsibility to equip students with the appropriate skills to handle the language of global communication and the various contexts in which it is used. When students are taught language use in the language courses and they are shown in the literature courses how poets, playwrights, prose fiction and non-fiction writers use English creatively at different times and in different contexts, their ability to pick up skills of accuracy, fluency (spoken and written), confidence, speed (in reading and writing) is accelerated. It is hoped that such students will graduate to become part of the competent and innovative human resource needed in the attainment of the SDGs (ETSSP, NDP 11, Vision 2036) as teachers, media practitioners, public relation officers, translators, interpreters, editors, language policy developers, pastors, community mobilizers, creative artists, politicians, bankers, and business executives.

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PURPOSE

The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with specialised knowledge, skills and competence in English Language and literature to be able to:

- Teach different aspects of English language and literature.
- Communicate effectively in grammatical English.
- Write and analyse imaginative literature.
- Conduct research in language and literature.
- Demonstrate professionalism.
- Utilize ICT in research and communication.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)

The minimum entry requirements for a Bachelor of Arts in English shall be NCQF level 4, Certificate IV (General Education or TVET).

There will also be access through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) and Credit Accumulation and Transfer (CAT) systems, in line with institutional and national policies.

QUALIFICATION AWARD AND CERTIFICATION

Minimum standards of achievement for the award of the qualification

To be awarded the qualification, a learner must have accumulated a minimum of 480 credits.

Certification

- Learners meeting the prescribed requirements will be awarded the qualification in accordance with the standards prescribed for the award of the certificate
- The Degree shall be known as Bachelor of Arts (English).

Below are some observations made with respect to how this qualification compares with the three identified institutions.

Similarities

The qualifications are similar in terms of the main exit outcomes, domains covered, assessment strategies and education and employment pathways.

- All qualifications stress comprehensive mastery of a body of knowledge
- Similar exit outcomes include communication, research, analytical, critical, innovation and problem-solving skills.
- All institutions cover language and literature
- Formative and summative assessment used
- All prepare graduates for further studies and a wide range of career opportunities in academia, public and private sector

Differences

- These institutions have an honour's qualification which UB does not have. Consequently, their qualifications are 3 years amounting to 360 credits with an additional year of 120 credits to be at par with this qualification which is four years with a minimum of 480 credits.
- Qualifications at these institutions include Creative writing, popular culture and new media unlike in the current qualification.
- The University of Alberta's credit system and the NCQF level differ from this institution and the other two.

Conclusion

This Bachelor of Arts (English) qualification therefore compares favourably with the qualifications studied in terms of the main exit outcomes, assessment strategies, employment/education pathways and domains covered. With four years of study, graduates of this qualification are sufficiently prepared for graduate programmes and various employment opportunities in different sectors anywhere in the world.
