RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

RATIONALE:

Botswana's transition to a knowledge-based economy requires not only technical and scientific training but expertise in human understanding. Knowledge of the nation's history has been recognized as essential to national identity, ever since Sir Seretse Khama's dictum that "A nation without a past is a lost nation, and a people without a past is a people without a soul."

The BA History qualification is informed by the National Cultural Policy (2001) and Botswana Vision (2036) which understands Botswana as a multilingual and multicultural country in which diversity is essential to its unity and development. As well, the qualification is in line with the

Revised National Policy on Education (RNPE, 1994), the National Human Resources Development Strategy (2009-2-22) and the Botswana Education and Training Sector Strategy Plan (2015-2020) which regard people as essential to development insofar as they know their past, show a clear sense of their identity, display self-esteem, act within a clear ethical framework, and communicate effectively and citizenship attributes, which are embedded in the qualification.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with specialised knowledge and skills to:

- understand the discipline of History including the Philosophy of History.
- understand the distinctive methodology that distinguishes History from other Humanities and Social Sciences.
- apply problem-solving skills to answer historical questions.
- link History with information from other disciplines.
- use ICT resources in historical investigation.
- use appropriate leadership and teamwork skills in research and presentation.
- present historical information both in academic discourse and for the public.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)

NCQF level 4, or its equivalent.

Entry can also take place through Recognition of Prior Learning and Accumulated Credits in line with the Institutional and National Policies.

REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPARABILITY

BA in History.

It is a three-year programme with a few compulsory courses at each level.

Bachelor's degree of 3 years (exit level 7): Minimum of 360 credits. Minimum credits at level 7 (i.e. third year level): 120. Also includes level 5 (1st year) and level 6 (2nd year) credits.

International:

BA (Hons) History. Three years.

The University of York has a concentrated programme with innovative features: issues about the nature of history receive a high degree attention in the first year, and in the second-year main courses are divided into ordinary "options" and specialized "explorations" allowing detailed study. - Year 1: Core modules (basic history) and selected "Opinion" (specialized) modules
- Year 2: Core modules (philosophy of history) and selected Opinion modules
- Year 3: Core: dissertation; selected Comparative History and Special Topic modules

Similarities:

Both these two qualifications, and the proposed qualification, involve both general historical skills and specific courses.

Allowing for the differences of entry level, these two qualifications and the proposed qualification involve the same amount of study and outcome level.

Both these qualifications, and the proposed qualification, prepare students for employment in other fields as

well as the specific subject of History.

Differences:

There is a marked difference between these two qualifications. The University of Cape Town offers relatively few options, whereas the University of York programme is highly flexible and study varies between students. (Also, there are differences due to national practice. York, like most English universities, has a programme that concentrates more heavily on the main subject, and admits students on a more flexible basis.) The proposed qualification is between the two: it is more similar to the Cape Town qualification in having a relatively fixed structure, but allows more freedom within it.

REVIEW PERIOD

The qualification will be reviewed after five years, or as necessary, according to the development of educational and human resources policies and strategies.
