## RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

## **RATIONALE:**

Social work is an academic and practice-based profession that enhances human well-being by helping people meet their needs and aspirations, with particular attention to the needs of the disadvantaged, dispossessed and the oppressed using the core mandates of promoting positive social change, social cohesion and social development, empowerment, and the liberation of people. Social work achieves this mission by applying



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scientific knowledge and skills, to enhance the functioning of individuals, families, and communities in their social environment. The knowledge and skills used by social workers consist primarily of theories and models from the social sciences, the humanities and indigenous knowledge and practice. Anchored on social justice and human rights, social workers intervene at the points where diversities of difference and systems of power, privilege, and deprivation (such as race/ethnicity, sexuality, age, religion, disability, lived experience), impact individuals, families, and community adversely. Within this scope of social work concerns, the profession promotes, restores, maintains, and enhances the social functioning of individuals, families, groups, organizations, and communities, playing various roles such as referral, brokerage, advocacy, to name but a few.

Over the past four decades, society has increasingly become complex and, consequently, social problems such as poverty and unemployment, violence, crime and delinquency, mental health problems, substance abuse and chronic health conditions are emerging. In pre-modern times, people depended on the extended family and their closely-knit communities for social support, social security, protection, and sense of belonging to manage such problems. Increasingly, however, breakdowns of structures of containment have been observed, calling for professional competencies and new approaches to deal with them. The qualification is developed to educate future social work professionals who can evaluate and intervene on multiple ecological levels relevant to the client system(s) being served.

The Master's in Social Work degree qualification is consistent with realizing the Botswana Vision 2036 of achieving "Prosperity for All" and is in line with Pillar 2 – Human and Social Development. The implementation is also consistent with National Development Plan 11 which focuses on promoting "Inclusive growth for the realization of sustainable employment creation and poverty eradication." The plan is aligned with the global, continental, regional initiatives such as the UN Sustainable Development Goals, African Union Agenda 2063, and the Revised SADC Regional Indicative Strategic Development Plan. Further, the MSW degree is aligned to the objectives of the Education and Training Sector Strategic Plan (2015-2020) whose mandate is the development of human capital, refocusing education and training towards the fulfilment of social and economic aspirations of the country. Other national policies and legislations implemented by social workers include the National Social Protection Framework (2018), Revised National Youth Policy (2010), The Children's Act of 2009, Adoption Act of 1952, National Foster Care Guidelines of 2016.



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Professional and competent social workers need ongoing learning to improve their knowledge, change attitudes and strengthen their skills and techniques in practice. The MSW qualification is designed to provide specializations in social work which will be reviewed and modified to suit the market.

#### **PURPOSE:**

The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with advanced knowledge, skills, and competences to:

- Initiate development of professional social work education and practice through research or reviewing existing knowledge.
- Demonstrate a high level of mastery of social work to retrieve, evaluate, analyse, and interpret information to make propositions and judgments.
- Demonstrate advanced knowledge at the frontier of a specialized social work area or cross-disciplinary fields.
- Conduct independent social work research and produce findings in the form of a research report.

## ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)

Minimum entry requirements:

- A Bachelor's degree in Social Work or cognate field at NCQF Level 7.
- There is provision for entry through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) and Credit Accumulation and Transfer (CAT).

#### **QUALIFICATION AWARD AND CERTIFICATION**

#### **Qualification Award**

A candidate is required to achieve the stipulated 240 credits inclusive of the fundamental, core and elective components, to be awarded the qualification of Master of Social Work

#### Certification

Upon successful completion of the qualification, a candidate shall be awarded a Master of Social Work and an official Academic Transcript.

### REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPARABILITY

This qualification has been benchmarked with the following:

Globally, social work is a recognized profession with training at certificate, diploma, bachelor's, master's, and Ph.D. levels. The International Federation of Social Workers and the International Association of Schools of Social Work have developed global standards for regulating social work education. Each country is expected to adapt these to their respective countries and regions. Thus, the master's qualification compares favourably to similar qualifications internationally.

Further, as part of the benchmarking for this qualification, a survey was undertaken of similar qualifications offered regionally and internationally using the Internet. External examiners and reviewers have also provided useful feedback on the development of an MSW qualification to make it competitive.

According to the South African Qualification Authority, the Master of Social Work degree is worth 180 credits post-BSW (Hons). Its purpose is to produce graduates with advanced and in-depth knowledge in a specialized social work and social welfare field, advanced research skills and competencies to engage in a chosen field of social work. The New Zealand Qualification Authority offers a Master of Social Work degree with 240 credits post-BSW. In both South Africa and New Zealand, the MSW degree is graded Level 9 out of 10.



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Other qualifications offered in countries such as United Kingdom generally emphasize development of competencies in research on social work and social welfare, social development, clinical social work, social policy and administration, community development, youth development, and management of human services. Some programmes combine coursework, research project and field work. Master's degree in UK universities is 180credits over 1-2 years fulltime post BSW (Hons.).

Although the qualifications examined generally follow similar structures and standards, there are differences, though not significant, in that some MSW programmes last for only one year, may involve course work only or course work and research and field practicum or MPhil.

This qualification generally compares well with all the qualifications studied since the exit outcomes cover similar scope and depth and are aligned to exit-level descriptors typical of this level and type of qualification as done within the region and beyond. Further to this, requisite competencies required for registration and accreditation with professional bodies such as BHPC and BONASW have been considered. What sets this qualification apart from the ones examined, is that there is provision for development of attributes such as indigenization, innovation, ethical research, student-centred learning, and excellence which are critical for social work in developing contexts. Furthermore, requisite competencies for globalisation of social work practice have been factored into the graduate profile as prescribed by the International Federation of Social Work (IFSW) and International Association of Schools of Social Work (IASSW).
