RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

RATIONALE:

There is a shortage of primary healthcare providers with the skills to provide crucial healthcare services in Botswana. Masters prepared Family Nurse Practitioners (FNPs), educated with advanced knowledge and skills to provide expert assessment, diagnosis, and management of disease and provide and lead health promotion services, are uniquely situated to fulfil the need in primary health care settings. Currently, there are insufficient numbers of Family Nurse Practitioners prepared at the master's level. The School of Nursing is the only institution offering a master's degree (FNP) in the country.

According to the Integrated Service Plan 2010-2020, there is a total shortfall of 164 FNPs that are needed in primary hospitals (64), districts (60) and referral hospitals (20). The National Development Plan 11 (2017 – 2023) calls for improving quality healthcare services through strengthened human capital. Human Resource Development Council (HRDC) Strategy indicates that advancing the education and number of professional nurses is one of the most important human resource priorities in Botswana.



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The World Health Organization Global Strategic Directions for Strengthening Nursing and Midwifery (2016 – 2020) has set goals to ensure an educated, competent, and motivated nursing and midwifery workforce. FNPs, as primary health care providers, are integral professionals to the attainment of this goal. According to the Essential Health Service Package for Botswana (2010), Botswana can't staff all levels of healthcare facilities with relevant competent staff as per standards and norms of staffing because of a shortage of human resources. The Ministry of Health and Wellness (MoH&W) aims to assist in training facilities for optimum human resource production. Therefore, increased numbers of masters prepared FNPs are a priority in ensuring the success of the health care system. This qualification will render graduates eligible to register as advanced clinicians with the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Botswana and other nursing regulatory bodies both regionally and internationally.

PURPOSE:

The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with advanced knowledge, skills and competence to:

- Diagnose and manage individuals, families, groups, and communities.
- Research to add to the body of nursing knowledge and assess, diagnose, and manage common primary healthcare problems, including non-communicable diseases.
- Provide health care and comprehensive wellness across the lifespan at the primary level.
- Practice and lead initiatives in hospital outpatient departments, clinics, long-term care facilities, community health centres and private practice.
- Provide advanced, focused, and comprehensive assessment and manage clients' which includes prescription of medication and ordering and interpreting diagnostic investigations at the primary care level.
- Promote, maintain and restore the health of individuals, groups, families, and communities across the lifespan primary level.
- Apply entrepreneurial skills in the delivery of services.

MINIMUM ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)

The minimum entry requirement for this qualification is:

Bachelor's Degree, NCQF level 7 or equivalent.

Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL):

There will be access through Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) and Credit Accumulation and Transfer (CAT) following the RPL and CAT National Policies.



The Master of Nursing Science (MNSc) in Family Nurse Practitioner structure comprises a fundamental, core, research and optional components worth 267 credits.

The students are expected to pass all the components as structured to be awarded a qualification. Successful program completion will qualify the graduate to be registered as a Family Nurse Practitioner specialist with the Nursing and Midwifery Council of Botswana.



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ASSESSMENT ARRANGEMENTS

Formative assessment

Formative assessment or continuous assessment contributing towards the award of credits should be based on course outcomes. This can include tests, assignments and projects, as well as simulated and real work settings. The contribution of formative assessment to the final grade shall be **60%**.

Summative assessment

The summative assessment shall contribute 40% of the assessment.

QUALIFICATION AWARD AND CERTIFICATION

Minimum standards of achievement for the award of the qualification

To be awarded a Master of Nursing Science in Family Nurse Practitioner, a candidate must achieve a maximum of **267** credits inclusive of 48 credits for Fundamental courses, 207 credits for Core courses and 12 credits for Optional/ Elective courses to be awarded the qualification.



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Certification

Candidates meeting prescribed requirements will be awarded the qualification following the standards prescribed for the award of the qualification and applicable policies.

SUMMARY OF REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPARABILITY

This qualification compares with the following:

The <u>Victoria University of Wellington</u>, New Zealand, NOF level 9, worth 240 credits, graduates will be leaders in their clinical environments and will have advanced clinical and research skills. They will be prepared to improve health outcomes through their knowledge and critique of current practice issues. Entry requirements-A bachelor's degree in Nursing and New Zealand Registered Nurse status.

The Master of Nursing Science comprises either a coursework option of eight courses or a research option of five courses and a thesis. Coursework covers the areas of assessment and clinical reasoning, pathophysiology, and research principles.

REVIEW PERIOD

The qualification will be reviewed every 5 years.
