## RATIONALE AND PURPOSE OF THE QUALIFICATION

## 1.1 Rationale

The need for mental health training and provision of services has been echoed globally both explicitly and implicitly in some cases. Through its Agenda 2063, Africa envisions "a strategic framework that aims to deliver on its goal for inclusive and sustainable development and is a concrete manifestation of the Pan African drive for unity, self-determination, freedom, progress and collective prosperity pursued under Pan Africanism and African Renaissance (The African Union Commission, 2020). This ideal reiterates the pillar of multicultural counselling and social justice which form a critical part of the mental health counselling program.



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The Sustainable Development Goal # 3 (SDG # 3) espouses healthy lives and promotion of well-being for all at all ages. For its targets it strives to strengthen the prevention and treatment of substance abuse, including narcotic drug abuse and use of alcohol. It further aims at reducing death and injuries from road accidents. These mental health concerns form part of the mandate of trauma counselling, a major component of the mental health counselling program.

Botswana's Vision 2036, Botswana National Policy on Mental Health of 2003 section 6 (pp. 10-11) and the Botswana Health Policy synchronized with the philosophy of World Health Organization (WHO) and the UN mandate that all countries should improve the health and the quality of life of their citizenry. These policy frameworks and declarations by international organizations show the need for introducing mental health counselling training programs to prepare professional counsellors to respond to contemporary issues faced by society. Republic of Botswana National Policy on Mental Health of 2003 stipulates the need for:

- Providing effective education and information in mental health
- Providing adequate and relevant in-service training in mental health to all health care personnel and other non-health professionals
- Reducing the incidence of suicide through the initiation of suicide prevention programmes in schools and the community
- Improving the awareness of youth on mental health issues by strengthening Peer Approach to Counselling by Teens (PACT) to include a mental health component.
- Empowering voluntary and community agencies with mental health knowledge to strengthen community participation in mental health issues and encourage a positive attitude towards mental health.

The introduction of a master's degree in mental health counselling also comes at a time when the Human Resources Development Council (HRDC), (2019) released a list of top occupations that are in demand currently and in the future. The HRDC stated problem solving skills, critical thinking, cognitive flexibility, emotional intelligence, diversity, ethics and team work as the soft skills that are in high demand for the future. Mental health practitioners fit well in this category and together with psychologists they provide psychological assessment and care to the clientele. Thus, the introduction of the Master of Arts in mental health counselling degree will go a long way to alleviate biopsychosocial ills such as HIV and AIDS which the Sustainable Development Goals stipulate as a top priority area.

#### **Purpose**



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The purpose of this qualification is to produce graduates with advanced knowledge, skills and competences to:

- Design, deliver information and evaluate mental health counselling services and activities.
- Provide training to pre- and in-service personnel across government and private sectors.
- Provide treatment to clients in diverse and multicultural settings and prevent mental illness.
- Attend to youth mental health issues in collaboration with existing organizations.
- Apply assessment procedures and diagnosis in various settings.
- Conduct research to inform his/her practice.

## ENTRY REQUIREMENTS (including access and inclusion)

The minimum entry requirement for admission to Masters of Arts (Mental Health Counselling) shall be:

- Bachelor degree, NCQF Level 7 in Counselling
- Through recognition of prior learning (RPL) and Credit Accumulation and Transfer (CAT) in line with institutional and national policies.

# **QUALIFICATION AWARD AND CERTIFICATION**

### 1.0. Award

To be awarded a Master of Arts in Mental Health Counselling qualification a candidate must have a minimum of 250 credits.



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## Certification

Candidates meeting the prescribed requirements will be awarded Master of Arts (Mental Health Counselling) and will be issued a certificate and an official certified transcript.

#### REGIONAL AND INTERNATIONAL COMPARABILITY

- i). University of Pretoria's 2-year M.Ed. in Learner Support, Guidance and Counselling and produces graduates who teach at the university level, provide learner support, and work as counsellors, and research scholars.
- (ii). University of Florida offers a Master of Education (Mental Health Counselling).

The similarities between the M.Ed Learner Support in Pretoria and the M.Ed Mental Health Counselling is that both provide modules in counselling course work. They are both housed in the Faculties of Education hence the title of the degree. However, the Mental Health Counselling qualification in Florida, emphasizes more on the clinical aspects rather than the research component which is regarded as a significant aspect. The M.Ed in Pretoria, leans more towards counselling in educational settings, while the mental health is more agency and community based. This qualification compares more favourably with the qualification in Florida in terms of the main exit level outcomes, domains and assessment strategies.

The qualification generally compares well with all the qualifications studied in terms of focus/domains, exit outcomes, assessment strategies and employment pathways.

#### REVIEW PERIOD

The qualification shall be reviewed after 5 years.
